2. VETERINARY ASPECTS "A"

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations, Art. 1011 and the duscipline rules..

"General Regulations", 21st Edition, revision 2005, will apply:

Art. 139.1

Every horse/pony entered for any competition at CSNs or CSI* in a foreign country, and all horses/ponies entered for other CSI**/***/****, CSIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official, valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 139.2

Horses/ponies taking part in CSNs and CSI** in their own country are not required to have such a passport as mentioned in paragraph 1. All such horses/ponies must be properly registered and identifiable by diagram. Unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin all horses/ponies must have a valid vaccination certificate.

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the "Veterinary Regulations" , Art. 1011 & the discipline rules.

"General Regulations" 21st Edition, effective 1st January 2005:

EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, VET. REGS. APPENDIX VI (except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given no less than 21 days and no more than 92 days apart.

In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding 12 months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must have been given within the preceding 7 days including the day of the competition or of entry into the competition stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer's instructions, which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling. In many cases booster injections are recommended by the manufacturers and by National Veterinary Authorities/Regulatory Authorities at intervals more frequent than 12 months.

SAMPLING FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES (Vet. Regs. Chapter V & VI and Annex III)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCI***/****, CSI***/****, CIOs, World Cup Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CIs sampling is recommended. In CICs***/****, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Art. VR 1017.1)

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME (GROUP I & II ONLY)

The Organising Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse/pony per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.

3. VETERINARY ASPECTS "B"

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES/PONIES

No special conditions nor vet. Controls when entering the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

CUSTOMS' FORMALITIES

No custom formalities entering Luxembourg.

NFs holding an international event in their country should inform their national veterinary authority and their customs authority at least four weeks prior to the event. They should request every facility to assist the movement of horses/ponies accompanied by FEI passports and the necessary veterinary certification at frontier crossing points into and out of their countries. (Vet. Regs. Art. 1004.2).

Under the Medication Control Programme (MCP) in **Groups I and II**, all samples collected in accordance with VR Art. 1016 & 1018 will be analysed by the *Laboratoire des Courses Hippiques, 15 Rue de Paradis, F – 91370 Verrrières-le-Buisson, France.* For events <u>other than</u> those listed in VR Art. 1016 or for events <u>other than</u> in Groups I and II, samples may be analysed at an alternative approved Laboratory (VR Art. 1021).

VIII MISCELLANEOUS

1) OBJECTIONS/COMPLAINTS - (Art. 167, 168, 170 & 171)

All complaints and objections to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of 100.- \in .

2) GENERAL CLASSIFICATION AT THE END OF THE COMPETITIONS

3) PRIZE-GIVING CEREMONY

All riders to present themselves for the prize-giving ceremony of each competition.

The owner of the winning horse is invited to the prize giving ceremony for the Grand Prix.

4) DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES AND INDEMNITIES - (Art. 130)

All paiements ar made in €. (Price money, entry fees etc.)

All paiement by cheque will be charged 25.- \in for banking fees.

Price-money will be distributed after the last competition.

A minimum of 5 prizes (prize money) must be distributed. Twenty-five percent of participants per competition must receive prize-money. All prize money listed in the schedule must be distributed to participants.

6) INSURANCES

"All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third persons caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses/ponies. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date."

7) EVENT'S ORGANISATION - (Art. 115.2)

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of Chefs d'Equipe and Ground Jury the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all competitors and officials as soon as possible and they must be reported to the Secretary General by the Foreign Judge.

8) ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS (Art. 133)

All riders, grooms and owners will receive a bracelet to permeit entrance to the show and to the stables.

9) DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY

There will be no deductions from the prize money.

In the event of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages), the English version will be decisive.

THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre International (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and competitors must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.
